Astronomy in the Two Dales

Hello, Starboy here, taking over from Starman for the next few months while he is busy rebuilding his starship. He has of course timed his break to coincide with the lighter evenings when it is difficult to do much astronomy. But anyway, here goes.

April is the last month in which the sky gets fully dark, and is a good time to observe the phases of twilight. The sun sets in Reeth at around 7.45 BST (British Summer Time) on the 1st of April, and then sets about 2 minutes later each day. But it doesn't get fully dark until the end of the evening and, as the sky darkens, you can do some interesting experiments.

The first of these requires a reasonable view low to the East, for example down Swaledale towards Richmond. If you have such a view, go out shortly after sunset on a clear night and look East. If conditions are favourable, you should be able to see the grey shadow of the Earth rising, surrounded by a semi-circle of pink. This pink area is known as the belt of Venus, and is caused by sunlight skimming through the atmosphere just above our heads. As it travels through the sky much of the blue light is scattered, leaving liaht red illuminate any dust or clouds above the Eastern horizon.

The second experiment involves estimating the end of civil twilight. This starts when the sun goes below the horizon, and ends when it becomes too dark to undertake normal activities. The fact that it stays light enough for

most purposes after the sun sets is reflected in the law on "lighting up time", which used to be a full hour after sunset but now (because of the speed of modern vehicles) is just half an hour after the sun goes down.

In terms of astronomy, the end of civil twilight is marked by the appearance of the first true stars. You have to discount the planets Mars and Jupiter, which will appear low in the West and East respectively as the sky darkens. But it is fun, especially if it isn't too cold, to sit outside and see who can spot the first stars and how long after sunset they appear.


The next phase of twilight is called "Nautical Twilight" because ships at sea can still see the horizon. When that can lonaer be seen. we. enter when astronomical twilight, only astronomers moan that it isn't fully dark yet. You can observe these changes with the Cyanometer printed on the next page. (That's a big word for a blue colour-chart.) Go outside on a clear night as the sun sets and hold the chart up towards the sky every 20 minutes or so to compare colours (a sun -lounger helps avoid falling over backwards). The colour high in the sky is best. Oh, and avoid any neighbours who might be puzzled, to say the least, as to why you are trying to read the gazette in the dark. The Starboy

Reeth Gazette Community Chest

This month's recipient is a ragged group of individuals. Lone Ranger Mike explains:

The Ragged Robins Conservation Volunteers are a merry band of 20+ men and women who give their time to maintain, improve and generally look after many of the footpaths and Swaledale bridleways around Arkengarthdale; and occasionally further afield in Wensleydale. Nearly every Thursday they will be out somewhere in the area. In 2016 they gave 514 work days over 45 working Thursdays. They come from as far as Washington, Northallerton and Healaugh.

The group have been operational in one guise or another for at least 10 years; carrying out conservation tasks as volunteers in the Yorkshire Dales National Park. They originated from a group of keen walkers from Richmond area who were keen to contribute to the upkeep conservation of the area. All their work is set by the National Park Rangers and can include anything from repairing dry stone wall stiles, strimming footpaths of overgrown vegetation, fixing gates, laying improved surfaces or maintaining drainage. You name it, they'll have a go.

Last month they were helping to reinforce the riverbank at Low Row by laying a living willow revetment. Before that they were restoring the old disused garage on the side of the Whitaside road for use by walkers and cyclists. For those of you who venture as far as Hudswell Woods - you should

be grateful for the heroic effort the Ragged Robins put into the new flight of steps there - it truly wouldn't have happened without their mammoth effort.

However, in the summer their main work comes when the annual growth of all things creeping and sprawling need cutting back to keep the footpaths and bridleways open for locals and visitors to enjoy. Give a Ragged Robin some loppers or a strimmer and they'll go all day. One of their annual tasks is to clear Skelgate Lane in time for the marathon each June. After that they know they will be strimming all those other narrower routes around Reeth for the next six weeks.

So next time you notice a route has been cleared or some other improvements made, then spare the Ragged Robins a thought. They don't volunteer for reward but they don't get much recognition for their hard work either; other than a pat on the back from the rangers - and that's wearing a bit thin.

Email Woes With New Computers And Windows 10 Upgrades

I have spent some time recently helping people to upgrade to Windows 10 and transfer files etc. to a new computer. In particular people are keen to move email and address books from older computers where all their information is stored on the computer and this has become a bit of a problem.

Until recently I recommended people to download and install Windows Live Mail - this made transferring from Outlook Express in Windows XP or Windows Mail in Vista (or Windows Live Mail on any computer) a relatively quick and painless process but now Microsoft have removed Windows Live Mail from support and you can no longer download it from their computers.

The "Mail" app that comes installed on Windows 10 is very basic to say the least. Annoyingly it has no facility for importing your old address book and emails. There is a facility to import addresses from limited number of web based email services.

There are a lot of email programmes

available to use as an alternative but I have to say I don't like the fact that almost all of them lock you into their way of doing things and very few have useable export functions to get your data out if you decide you want to change.

The two solutions I have come up with are:

1) Microsoft Outlook

This will import data from older Microsoft Programmes (with a bit of persuading) but for many it is overkill and it is not free. If you subscribe to Microsoft Office 365 you have access to all Office programmes including Outlook but then you are locked into an annual subscription. The annual licence isn't ridiculously overpriced - especially if you have more than one computer but it is still annoying. Outlook is also squarely aimed at the business user which means for many home users it has a lot of features you don't need and can be potentially confusing if you want a simple system.

2) Web based email

You can use web based email through your browser. Most providers allow you to access your email via a webpage. This has a number of advantages - it is universally available (so you can check and send emails when you are not at home) and most services now link to smart phones so you can check on the move.

If you hate the website version of your email (I personally can't abide BT's website) you can choose to use another service such as Gmail or Hotmail simply set up a new account and within the settings you can add your existing email account and continue to use your old email address or addresses. This is mv preferred method these days - and I prefer Gmail as the method. The Gmail website works well and they produce excellent apps smartphones which take full advantage of the service features.

One final thought - this last method also gives you an ideal way to change your email address from your service provider to a free web based account while not losing access to your service provide account. If you ever plan to try a new internet provider it is a good idea not to get stuck using their email system as when you move you may well lose that email address. A web based email address like gmail is not tied to your internet provider so you won't lose it if you change internet service.



New Beginnings At Keld

'Keld is the last and the highest village in Swaledale,' wrote Ella Pontefract in 1934. She goes on: It is 'a goal to be reached from the valley, a haven to come down to from the hills. There are farms and hamlets beyond it, but the real life of the Dale stops there. It is a metropolis for the head of the Dale.'

A lot has been going on in this metropolis recently.

Many will already know the visitor centre converted from former stables on the lower floor of the Keld Literary Institute. Opened in 2011 and refurbished in 2016, this was an early project of a new charity, The Keld Resource Centre, which was set up to look after the old Manse, school and Institute in Keld and find a modern use for them. The charity restored the Manse in 2008, now let out for holidays.

In 2016 they tackled the upper floor of the Institute, derelict since the Foot and Mouth epidemic of 2001. It is now an absolutely delightful multi-functional meeting place and events venue: The Upper Room, Fully accessible, it is praised by all users for its comfort. its inspirational atmosphere, and the high quality facilities, whether for a lecture to 25 or a team-building session for twelve or sixteen

But there is more. Since Christmas an energetic and dedicated group of local residents has been creating the Community Orchard. Formerly an allotment, this land behind the Manse is being transformed by the volunteers, and will shortly be planted up with fruit trees and fruit bushes. There will be somewhere to sit to enjoy the view.

And there is yet more. Aware that winter walkers often find themselves in Keld with nowhere to go for a cup of





New Notes And Coins

Love them or hate them, the new polymer £5 notes are here to stay. The paper £5 notes are not.

You can continue to spend paper £5 notes as usual until 5th May 2017. After this they will cease to be legal tender and will no longer be accepted by shops. Some retailers, banks and building societies may choose to accept paper £5 notes after the withdrawal date; however, this is at the discretion of the individual institution. The Bank of England will always exchange its old-series notes.

The polymer £10 note will be issued in September 2017 and the £20 note by 2020.

The new 12-sided £1 coin entered circulation on 28th March 2017. Businesses across the UK who handle cash have been informed of the need to prepare for the introduction. Many will have upgraded their machines to accept the new £1 coin, however, not all machines will work with the new coin from the date of introduction.

The legal tender status of the round £1 coin will be withdrawn on 15th October 2017. From this date shops

will no longer accept these coins, but you will still be able to take them to your bank. The Royal Mint advises people to use their coins or return them to their bank before 15th October.

Upper Dales Family History Group

We welcomed many visitors to our February meeting to hear the truly fascinating story of Alice Thornton who lived through one of the most unsettled and dangerous periods in this country's recent history. Drawing on Alice's lengthy autobiography which she wrote after being widowed in 1668, her own words were spoken by Rosi Keatinge and the background was introduced by Marion Moverley who had written the script.

Alice was born in 1627 at Kirklington near Bedale although her family also had property at Hipswell near Catterick and she had an aunt who lived at St Nicholas on the edge of Richmond. However much of her privileged and wealthy childhood was spent in Dublin where her father was eventually appointed Lord Deputy of Ireland and she was able to receive a good education.

Her father's untimely death in 1640 left the family in great danger and they returned in 1642 to an England torn by warring factions, where travel was dangerous but staying at home could be even more so. Landing in Chester which was under siege at the time and encountering threats from troops on the road, Alice's widowed mother eventually got her children safely to Hipswell Hall only to find Scottish and Parliamentarian troops impounding their goods and demanding board and lodging.

As Royalists, the family estates had been taken over by the Parliamentarians. In order to help her brother recover his property and under

duress from her family, Alice eventually agreed to an arranged marriage with William Thornton from a Parliamentarian puritan family in 1651.

Alice's journal records the joys and sadness of her married life through ten successive pregnancies from which only three children survived more than an few days. William died in 1668 leaving his family in a precarious situation financially. The Thorntons had already got badly into debt trying to reclaim her inheritance from the Irish estates. and educating her only son impoverished Alice's circumstances still further.

She had a remarkably long life for the time, not dying until 1707, but never again enjoyed the comfortable existence she had known as a child and never really being in control of her own destiny. The story of Alice tells us something of the life of women in days gone by. From her descriptive memoirs we can imagine the life our many times arandmothers great mav experienced, with the added advantage of having a local setting with many of the houses she lived in existence.

This month's meeting is on Wednesday, April 26, at 2.00pm in Harmby Village Hall, when the speaker is Mary Randles on 'Albert's Story'; her research into a mystery in her family which took her to Dallowgill and Baldersdale.

It's A Kind A Magic

Every year in late March / early April, frost and snow permitting, we hold a workshop in Reeth Community Orchard, to split many of the existing perennials. These are the general guidelines we use:

- 1. Dig up plant carefully,
- 2. Sit (the plant, not you.) on top of grass or path and EITHER,
- Chop plant into 2 or 3 parts with a sharp spade, OR
- Prise roots apart with 2 forks back to back (best for plants with loose, fibrous roots).
- 5. Replace 1 part and pot-up the others.

As you will find, this is a wonderful way of making free plants, and it invigorates the original plant.

Potting-up

- 1. On the potting bench, mix 1 part bought compost, 1 part soil, and 1 part Orchard compost.
- Choose a suitably sized pot, and add compost mix to the bottom.
- 3. Add plant, more compost and tap the pot to settle the contents.
- 4. Water and label.

We allow 6 weeks to make good roots. Magic.



BT consultation on the removal of payphones: The Council was informed that Richmondshire District Council had recommended that the payphones should not be removed.

Gunnerside Ghyll: It was agreed to arrange a meeting with the YDNPA ranger, Michael Briggs to look at the trees in the Ghyll.

Light at Toledo, Low Row: The Council was informed that there is a new pole on order for this light, which will be repaired once this has been received.

Great North Air Ambulance: A cheque for £50 was donated to the GNAA.

Wall at Lodge Green, Gunnerside: The Clerk was asked to contact Highways regarding wall at Lodge Green which is not in very good condition:

District Ward Boundary Review: The Council was advised that Richmondshire District Council are looking at the number of councillors, which currently stands at 34, and would like to reduce this to a number possibly in the 20s; although RDC have advised that they do want to continue to reflect the community and not cut across parish boundaries. Swaledale is the biggest ward with the smallest numbers of electors: however Swaledale and Reeth and Arkengarthdale combined would be too many for a single ward. RDC advised that ward names may change. Parish Councils are being asked for their views by July, and then a final decision will be made.

YDNPA: Article 4 direction The Council was notified that on 16th January 2017, YDNPA made an 'Article

4 Direction' which if confirmed, will remove a 'permitted development right' that would otherwise allow light industrial premises to be converted to dwellings without full planning permission.

Ash tag project: YNDPA had contacted the Council to raise awareness of the threat of Ash die back fungi.
